It is believed that Anthony was one of three brothers who came to Fort Wayne in 1850. His brothers, Henry and Francis were older and came before Anthony. Nothing is known of the family in Germany.

A newspaper article described Anthony as a friendly and popular man who had many friends as well as being a noble and generous man. It also stated that he fractured his limb when young and was the immediate cause of his death.

He worked for Gerhard Rekers, who had a general store and was also the brother of his wife. He later worked for Trentman & Sons Grocery at 86 Columbia St. for thirty years. Pallbearers were listed as Jacob Alter, Michael Gruber, Adam Buchheit, Peter Pierre, Gerhard Rekers and William Brossard. Because his wife died at the age of 51 and there were small children at home, Mrs. Krock was hired to help the oldest daughter, Anna, take care of the home responsibilities. When Anna married Gerhard Grimme, he came to live in the Gocke home. After Anna and Gerhard

purchased their own home on Fairfield Avenue, Anthony came to live with them and remained in their home until his death.
