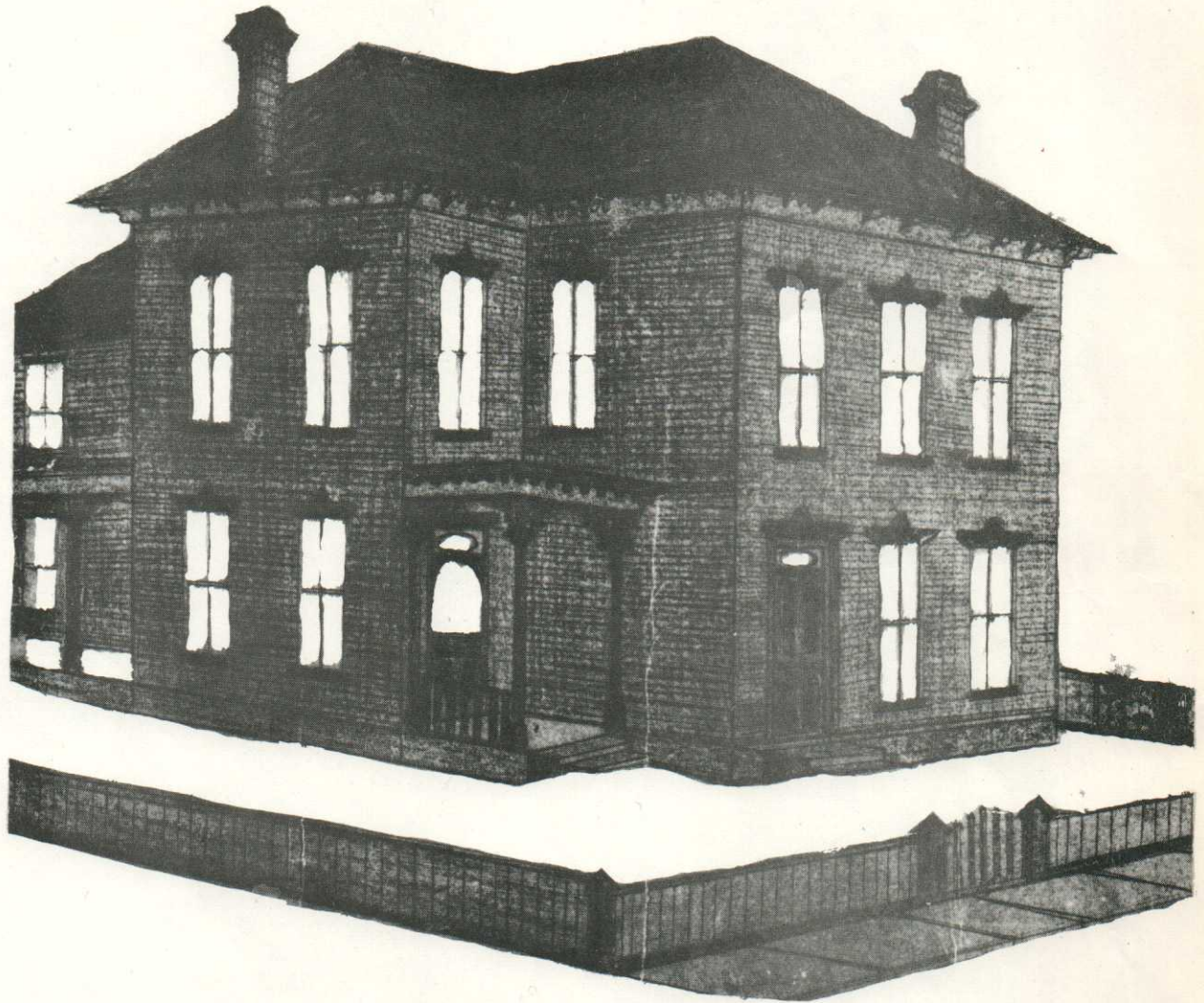

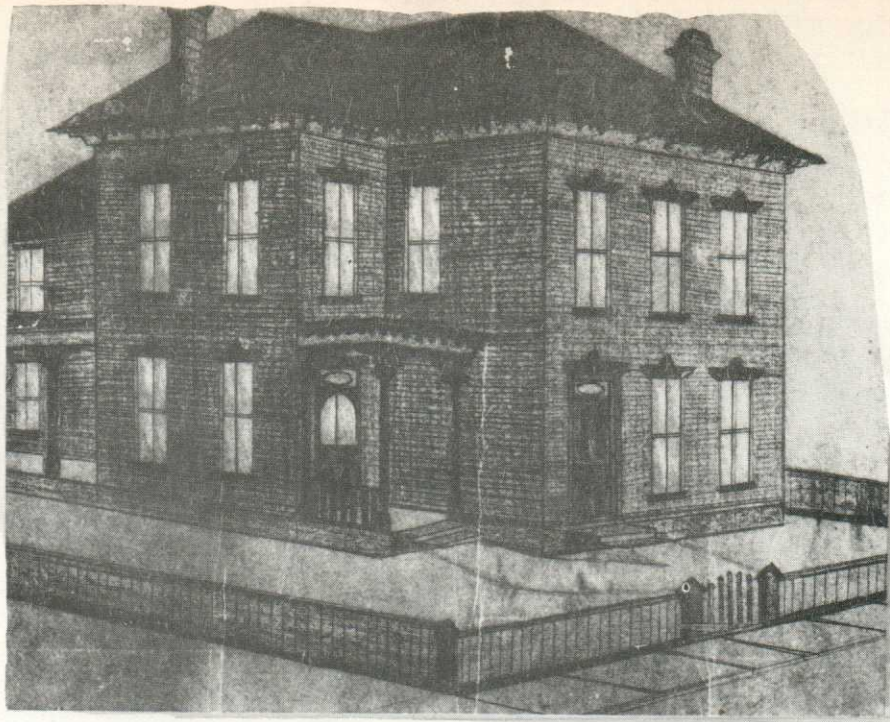

The house pictured above was located on the southwest corner of West Wayne and Harrison Streets. It was the home of Anthony and Elizabeth Rensman Gocke.

ANTHONY GOCKE was born in Osenbruike (also spelled Osnabruck) West Phalia, (near Paterborn) Germany, on November 3, 1815. He immigrated to this country in 1850 at age 35. He landed in New Orleans after a voyage of twelve weeks. He went to Vincennes, Indiana by boat and remained there until the spring of 1851. He came to Fort Wayne in that year on the Wabash-Erie Canal and lived with his brother Francis Gocke. He worked for Gerhard Rekers General Store and later at the Trentman Grocery, 86 Columbia St. He died in 1897 at age 82 and is buried in the Catholic Cemetery. In 1855 he married -

ELIZABETH RENSMAN, born in 1824 in Germany. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Mathias Rensman, 47 Walnut St. Fort Wayne. Mr. Rensman was also employed at the Trentman Grocery. He died in December of 1874 and is buried in the Catholic Cemetery. Elizabeth Gocke died at age 51 in January of 1875. She is buried in the Catholic Cemetery. There were six children - Frank A., Dayton, Ohio - Henry J., Denver, Colorado - Louis H., August C., Clara J., Fort Wayne and -

ANNA GOCKE GRIMME, born in 1858 in the home pictured above and died in 1929 at age 71. She was married from this house in 1882 to Gerhard B. Grimme and three of their five daughters were born here. She is buried in the Catholic Cemetery. Gerhard B. Grimme was the son of Adelaide Rekers and -

JOHN H. GRIMME, born in Hanover, Germany on August 4, 1822. He immigrated to this country at age 17 and lived in New York City for about three years where he learned the tailoring business. He moved to Pittsburgh, to Cleveland and then to Dayton, Kentucky where he lived for thirty years. He moved to Fort Wayne in 1871 and opened a tailoring establishment on West Wayne Street where the Louis Mohr Building stood in 1898. He later moved the tailoring establishment to 114 South Calhoun Street (the present 900 block). His two sons Gerhard B. and John C. were employed here. He was a soldier in the Civil War in the Union Forces of Kentucky. He died on April 18, 1898

at the Grimme home at 83 Brackenridge Street, Fort Wayne. He is buried in the Catholic Cemetery. In 1845, he was married to ADELAIDE REKERS, born in 1822 in Hanover, Germany. She came to Fort Wayne in 1840 at age 18. A few years later she moved to Cincinnati, Ohio. She married Gerhard Grimme there in 1845. Her brothers, Gerhard and Bernard Rekens were also residents of Fort Wayne about this time. They were also tailors and later operated a grocery store at 116 West Washington Street. Anthony Gocke was employed here for a short time upon arriving in Fort Wayne. Adelaide Grimme returned to Fort Wayne in 1871 with her husband. She died in February of 1916 at the Grimme home on 313 Brackenridge (same as 83 Brackenridge) at the age of 94. She was survived by 18 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren. John and Adelaide Grimme had five children - Elizabeth Gocke (Mrs. Louis), Theresa Keller (Mrs. A.J.), Anna Petgen (Mrs. F.A.), John C. and

GERHARD B. GRIMME, born March 12, 1856, in Dayton, Kentucky. He moved to Fort Wayne with his family in 1871. He was employed at the John H. Grimme Tailoring Co., which later became known as John H. Grimme & Sons Tailoring Co. He married Anna Gocke in 1882 at the Gocke home and resided there until 1887. He had one brother, John C. and three sisters, - John and his wife Sarah had two sons and two daughters. Elizabeth married Louis Gocke who was his wife's brother. They had one daughter, Vera who married Vern Tannehill. Theresa was married to A. J. Keller. Anna married F. A. Petgen. - Gerhard and Anna Grimme were the parents of five daughters, - Adelaide Becker, (Mrs. Frank) had two daughters, Irene Lallak - Mildred Nagel. Lillian Kramer (Mrs. Charles) had one son, Gerald married to Martha Lill, - two daughters - Marian Nomina (Mrs. Art) and Virginia Derheimer (Mrs. Joseph). Irene Harber Mrs. Wm.) had two sons and one daughter. Thomas and Stephan - Ruthanne Benbow. Hortense Mauch (Mrs. Clarence) had two sons, Donald and Herbert and two daughters Helen DeLuna and Betty Gmeiner. Henrietta McArdle (Mrs. John)

OSNABRUIKE, GERMANY is located in an area called Westphalia in the north-west part of Germany, a state in the West German Federal Republic. (Formerly a Province of Prussia) Westphalia lies between the valleys of the Rhine River and the Weser River. The name means "western plain". In 1815, the year that Anthony Gocke came to the United States, this entire duchy was assigned to Prussia. After World War II, it became part of the British Zone. Osnabruck is located 66 miles southwest of Bremen on the Hase River. It has a port on the Middle Land Canal to the north and it is a rail junction. It is not far from Hanover, Germany, the city that the Grimme family had come.



The house pictured above is located at 1808 South Fairfield. It was the home of Gerhard and Anna Grimme. They lived there from 1887 until the early 1900. Their last two daughters were born here. Anthony Gocke lived here after the death of his wife. The picture was taken in August of 1908.

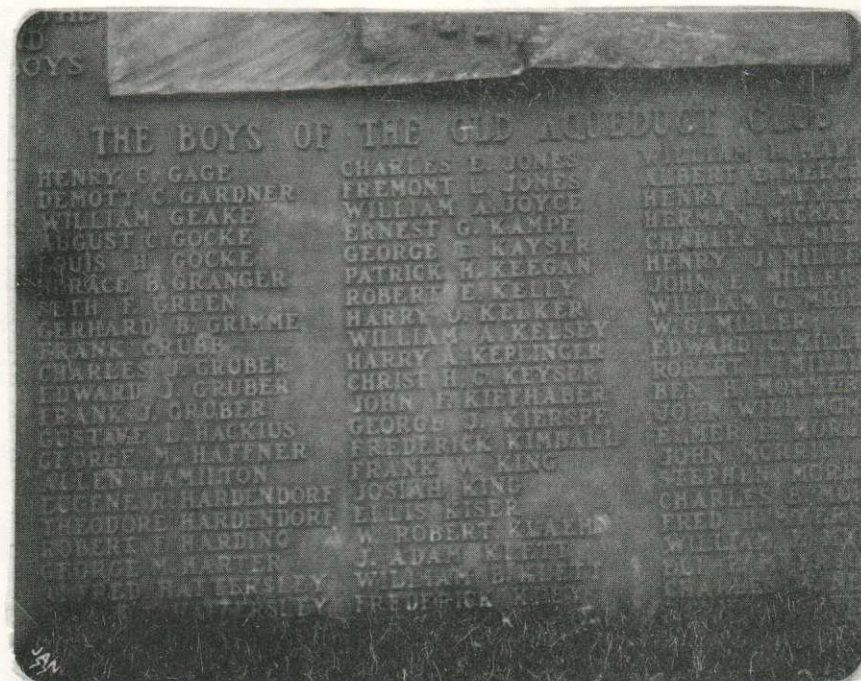


The house pictured above is located at 2322 South Clinton St. and was the home of the Grimme family after moving from the home on Wester St. Adelaide Becker and her family lived there after the death of Anna Gocke Grimme in 1929, with Gerhard Gimme until her death.

Point of Interest - Clara Gocke, the sister of Anna Gocke married Henry Kramer, the brother of the husband of Lillian Gimme. The Kramers were from the Dayton - Hamilton, Ohio area. Louis and Anna Gocke, who were brother and sister married Gerhard and Elizabeth Grimme, who were also brother and sister.

And

The John H. Grimme Tailoring Co. moved from 114 S. Calhoun St., which is the present 900 South Calhoun St. to 2020 South Calhoun St. There were two businesses side by side - The Peerless Dry Cleaning Co. and the Tailoring Co. When the tailoring company was at the 114 S. Calhoun address the John H. Grimme family resided at this address also.



The above statue and the inscriptions written there is located in the park strip on the corner of Main and Rockhill Sts. The statue depicts the members who belonged to, The Boys of the Old Aqueduct Club. Of interest are the names of the Gocke, Grimme and Kelly families.



The house pictured above was the residence of Peter and Margaret McArdle. Peter McArdle was the son of Owen and Anne McKinley McArdle, who lived and died in the village of Cullyhanna, in the parish of Creggan, County Armaugh, Ireland. Owen and Anne McArdle were the parents of fourteen children, four of whom were known to have come to the United States. Of these four children, it is known that Mary McArdle married a man named McDonald and had at least two daughters. She ran a boarding house in New York City. John McArdle served in the Civil War. He died aboard ship in the Gulf of Mexico and was buried at sea. James and Peter McArdle, after working on the police force and as hod carriers in New York City, obtained land grants and settled in Allen County, Monroe Township, Indiana. They married sisters, Margaret and Mary English, who were the daughters of Edward English and Margaret Anglin. Margaret Anglin was first married to a man named O'Toole and it was in this marriage that Margaret and Mary were born. After the death of Mr. O'Toole Margaret O'Toole married Edward English and the girls were adopted by him. James McArdle and Mary English had no children.

Peter McArdle and Margaret English had nine children. - Helen, the first born died at the age of four months. Harry, Mary and Marguerite did not marry. Rose became Sister M. Rose-Anne, C.S.C. Frank married Rose Reising. They had eight children - Robert, Joseph Rosemary Davies (Mrs. Harry), Helen Hall (Mrs. Edw.), James, William, Jeanette and Jack. Charles married Frances Renkel. They had two daughters - Patricia Frye (Mrs. Coyle) and Mary Margaret (Mrs. Paul Schall. James married Irma Smith. There were no children. John married Henrietta Grimme.

Harry, Mary and Marguerite continued to live on the farm after the death of their parents. The farm was located on the McArdle Road and consisted of two hundred acres. Peter McArdle came to Monroeville in 1875. He married Maggie English in 1881. He was one of the builders of St. Rose Catholic Church in Monroeville as the corenerstone of the church so states. Peter and Margaret McArdle are buried in the Catholic Cemetery in Monroeville as are many other members of the McArdle family.

OF INTEREST

In the Public Library in Fort Wayne, from the book, "Community Biographical Record of Fairfield County, Conn." the following is recorded:

Dr. John Henry McArdle, Fairfield County, Conn., born in 18 , son of Patrick McArdle, a native of County Armagh, Ireland, who came to America in 18 , and settle in Brooklyn, N. Y. He was married to Ellen Murphy of Wexford, Ireland. There were five children, - Edward, deceased, Frances and Ellen were nuns, Mary, deceased, and Dr. John Henry, unmarried.

(Peter McArdle also came to the United States in 18 .)

AND

Peter McArdle had a cousin Jim, who lived in Los Angeles at the same time Peter was living in Monroeville. He was born in the United States and returned with his parents to Ireland until age 17. He returned to America at that time. He was married and had a son John. His wife died and he remarried. A daughter Katherine was born in this marriage. She is now Katherine Jacobs and lives in Los Angeles.

JOHN EDWARD McARDLE was born on November 22, 1884, in Monroeville, Indiana. He attended the Monroeville schools and was graduated from Indiana Medical School in 1907. He served internship at St. Joseph Hospital for two years and later served as President of the Staff at St. Joseph's. The home pictured above was the family home from the time of the marriage of John and Henrietta Grimme on September 6, 1910, until 1943. The north portion of the house served as the office for Dr. McArdle until the property at 2201 South Calhoun St. was converted into offices for both Dr. John McArdle and his son, Dr. Edward McArdle. Dr. John McArdle practiced medicine with Dr. L. Park Drayer for a time before going into practice by himself. He also served as Coroner. John and Henrietta were the parents of six children. Edward G. married Nancy Fox - who had seven sons and two daughters - - John E., Edward G. Jr., Patrick, Timothy, Daniel, Louis, Shawn, Colleen and Nancy.

John L. married Clara Leist who had three sons and two daughters - - Michael, Stephan, John, Carol Ann and Catherine.

Richard B. married Dorothy Keenan who had three sons and two daughters

Richard B. Jr., Kevin, Christopher, Sheila and Maureen.

James C. married Billie Lou Beaver who had one son and three daughters

James C. Jr., Kathleen, Melinda, Margaret,

Joan T. married Thomas J. Kelly Jr., who had six sons and two daughters - - Susan, Maureen, Thomas J. III, John, Dennis, Matthew, Joseph, Richard.

Marita G. married Daniel Kelly, the brother of Thomas Kelly, who had four sons and seven daughters - -

Daniel Jr., Peter, Patrick, Michael, Molly, Katherine, Ann Marie, Julia, Colleen, Martha, Sharon. (Twins-Gerard & Christopher died at birth)

John Edward McArdle died on St. Patrick's Day, 1940. He is buried in the Catholic Cemetery in Fort Wayne, Indiana.



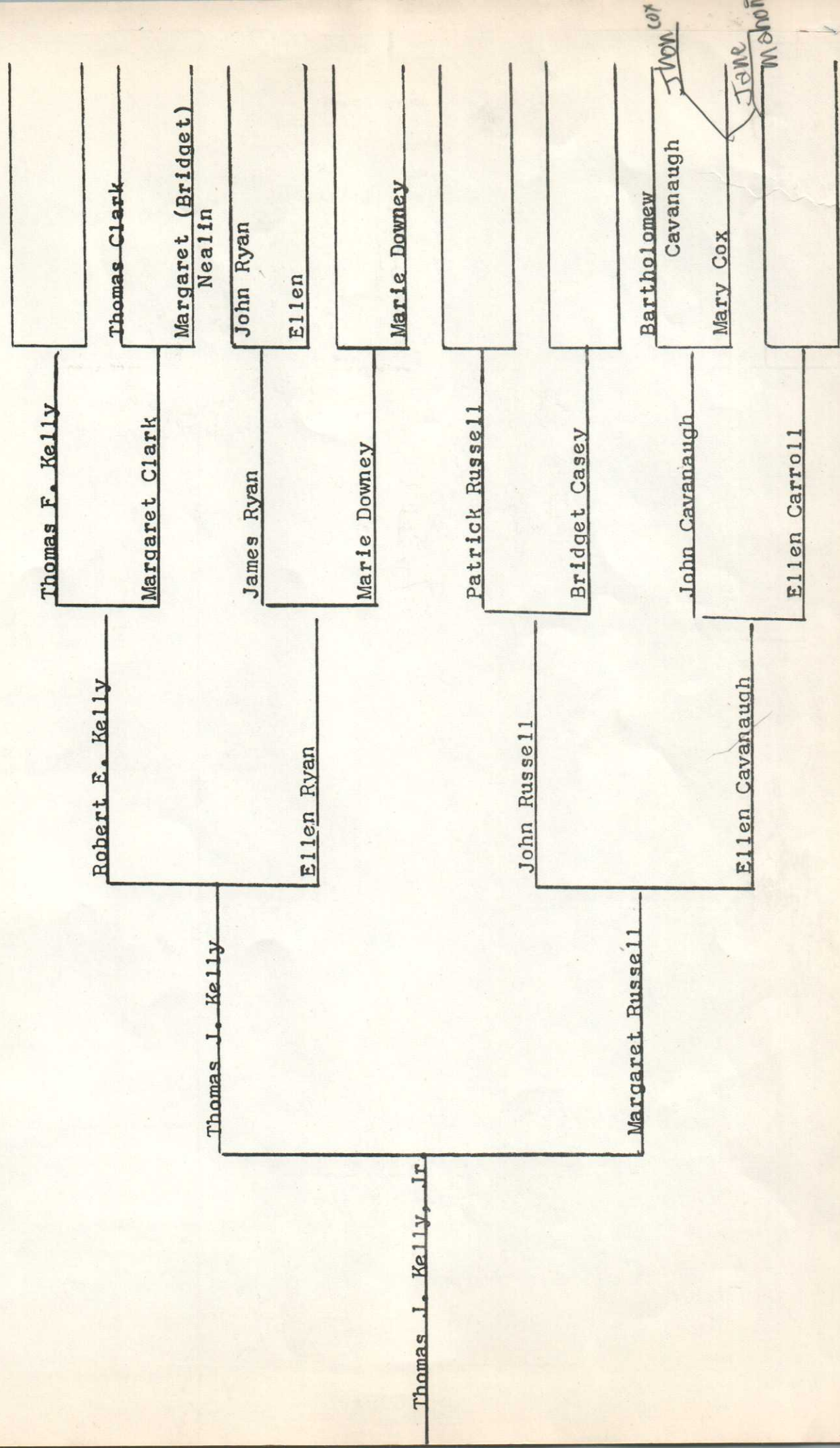
HENRIETTA GRIMME McARDLE was born September 30, 1887, in the home on the corner of Wayne and Harrison Sts., the daughter of Gerhard B. and Anna Grimme. She attended St. Paul's Catholic School and the Fort Wayne Business College. She was employed by the General Electric prior to her marriage to Dr. McArdle in 1910. She was bookkeeper and manager of the office and home on 2205 S. Calhoun St. until 1943. At that time she sold her home and moved to the home pictured above at 401 West Oakdale Drive. James and Marita were married while living here. In 1949, Henrietta and Joan moved to the Fairfield Manor at 2301 South Fairfield Avenue where she lived until five years before her death on August 17, 1973. She lived at St. Anne's Nursing Home for those five years. Joan married Thomas Kelly at the time they were living at the Fairfield Manor.

Nurses who worked for Dr. and Mrs. McArdle at the time they live on 2205 S. Calhoun St. were: Marie Breman, Henrietta Hohman, Mildred Hohman, Mickey McGuire, Katie Bresnahan, Catherine Schoenher.

The KELLY (or O'KELLY) family is descended from Milesius, King of Spain, through the line of his son, Heremon. The founder of the family was Colla de Crioch, son of Colla Vais or Hais, King of Ireland A. D. 315. The ancient name Cealleig, signifying "For War", was derived from one of their ancestors, Coellach, a celebrated chief in the ninth century. The titles of the Heads of this Clan were Chief of Hy Many and Prince of Bregia. Their possession were located in the present counties of Dublin, Kildare, Roscommon, and Tyrone. - - The Kellys played a prominent part in the history of Ireland. One of them, Tadhg O'Kelly, Chief of Hy Mania was among the commanders under Brian Boru at the Battle of Clontarf, 1014. In that battle, which overthrew the Danish armies, Tadhg was killed. - - The Kellys also fought resolutely against the encroachments of the English until resistance was in vain. Feargus O'Kelly rid the province of Connaught of the brutal English Governor whom Queen Elizabeth had sent to exterminate the Catholic clergy and laity of the province. - - Hugh Kelly (born 1739) a dramatist of note, and Michael Kelly, (born 1764) a distinguished musician, were other famous bearers of a famous name.



THIRD AND BARTHOLD STREETS

The house pictured above is located on the corner of Third St. and Barthold St. The original house was moved three lots west and the present one was built and still stands. These homes were located in Clark's Addition, Bloomingdale, in Fort Wayne, Indiana. The Clark family had come from Toledo, Ohio in the 1840's.

Thomas and Bridget Clark are known to have had three children. In 1850, it is recorded in the Fort Wayne City Directory that Thomas, Bridget, Margaret and son Thomas lived in and owned the property so described above. It is still known as Clark's Addition. Mary Ellen Clark was the third child. She was a tutor for the MacDougall children.

She married a man named Heiber. She died in childbirth and is buried with her baby in the Fort Wayne Catholic Cemetery. Thomas Clark was born in County Clare in Ireland. His wife, Bridget Nealin Clark was also born in Ireland. They are buried in Fort Wayne.

Margaret Clark was born in 1842 in Toledo, Ohio, and died in 1912. She came to Fort Wayne at age two and was married to Thomas F. Kelly. Margaret Clark Kelly was survived at the time of her death by her son Robert E. Kelly and her brother Thomas Clark of Junction City, Kansas. Her first child died as an infant. (Edward).

Thomas F. Kelly was born in County Clare, Ireland, in 1831. He came to Fort Wayne in 1853, at the age of twenty two. He was a canal boat captain on the Wabash Erie Canal under Bird & Bratton. He was one of the builders of the Richmond Railroad. He served in the Civil War in the Indiana Regiment, member of Sion S. Bass Post, G.A.R. Thomas F. Kelly died on February 3, 1893 and is buried in the Fort Wayne Catholic Cemetery.

Robert E. Kelly was born on October 27, 1864. He was employed as an engineer on the Lake Erie & Western Railroad and was active in the political life of Fort Wayne during his lifetime. He served as Recorder in 1908 and as a member of the Board of Works in 1914. While employed by the Railroad, he met Ellen Ryan in Rushville, Indiana. They were married in St. Mary's Catholic Church in Rushville on May 15, 1888.

The home pictured above was the original house that stood on the corner of Third and Barthold Streets. It was moved three lots west and is there at this time. It was probably the original home of the Clark family and later the Thomas F. Kelly family.

James J. Ryan was the father of Ellen Ryan. He was born in Ireland in 1837. He lived his life in Rushville, Indiana and is buried there. He died in 1902. He was married to -

Marie Downey came from County Kildenny in 1857 to the United States in 1857 at age 14. She was born in March of 1843 and died August 7, 1875 at age 32. There were five children from this marriage. - - Katie, who died at age 4, - John, who died at age 1½ yrs, - Richard who married a girl named Ada and moved to Little Rock, Arkansas and is buried there, She is buried in the Catholic Cemetery in Rushville, Indiana.

Ellen Ryan was born in Rushville, Indiana in 1866. She came to Fort Wayne after her marriage to Robert Kelly in 1888. She lived in the homes on Third and Barthold Streets and died in 1940. She is buried with her husband in the Catholic Cemetery in Fort Wayne. Robert and Ellen Kelly were the parents of eight children. Genevieve died in infancy. Marie married to Edward Disser and the parents of nine children. Lawrence married Katherine McCarthy who had two children. Robert married Irene Griebel who were parents of three daughters. Josephine, Katherine and Anne did not marry. Thomas married Margaret Russell.

OF INTEREST - Anastasia Ryan, who was born in 1840 and died in 1856 at age 16, was the daughter of John and Ellen Ryan. She was the sister of James Ryan and is buried in Rushville at the Catholic Cemetery with Marie Downey Ryan and Marie and James infant children. She was also born in Ireland.

Marie Downey came to the United States with her Mother, also named Marie or Mary. She lived a long life in this country.



2412 Webster Street

The home of Elizabeth Cavanaugh Finnell in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Margaret Russell Kelly came to this home from Lemont Illinois.

MARGARET RUSSELL KELLY was born December 25, 1899 in Lemont, Ill. She attended the schools in Lemont and came to Fort Wayne in 1915 and made her home with her Aunt, Mrs. Elizabeth Cavanaugh Finnell. (Mrs. James) She worked for the Northern Indiana Public Service Co. where she met and married Thomas J. Kelly on October 10, 1916. Margaret Kelly died on August 27, 1974 and is buried in the Fort Wayne Catholic Cemetery. Margaret was the daughter of - JOHN RUSSELL, born June 15, 1856 and died on July 13, 1917. He lived his lifetime in Lemont and is buried there. His parents were PATRICK RUSSELL born March 17, 1830 in Tipperary, Ireland. He died in Lemont in March 25, 1892. - and BRIDGET CASEY born in 1846 in County Cork, Ireland. She died on October 11, 1896 and is buried in Lemont, Illinois with her husband. There were six children from this marriage - - Bridget Russell Newell who lived in Ottawa, Illinois - Edward, who lived in Lockport, Illinois, - Mary Russell Boyle, Lemont, - Kathryn Russell Nicholson, Lemont, - William and John Russell who married - ELLEN CAVANAUGH was born May 24, 1859 in Hastings, Illinois. She lived most of her life in Hastings and Lemont but moved to Fort Wayne after the death of her husband. She died in Fort Wayne on August 13, 1933, and is buried in the Fort Wayne Catholic Cemetery. The Russell home in Lemont was located at 3224 Wells St. which was later named 3235 5th Avenue. Ellen Cavanaugh was the daughter of - John and Ellen Carroll Cavanaugh. John and Ellen Cavanaugh were the parents of six children - Mable Barry, Elizabeth Shultz, Nellie, Joseph, who died in infancy, and James.

JOHN CAVANAUGH was born in 1833 in the County of Roscommon, Ireland, parish of Boyle. He came to the United States on January 5, 1850, at age 17. He died May 3, 1888 and is buried in Lemont, Illinois. ELLEN CARROLL CAVANAUGH was born in 1830 in the County of Roscommon, Ireland, Parish of Boyle. She died at age 39 in Hastings, Illinois on December 22, 1869. John Cavanaugh was the son of - BARTHOLOMEW CAVANAUGH, born in 1798 in the County of Roscommon, Ireland, Parish of Boyle. He died Nov. 7, 1872. and - MARY COX CAVANAUGH, born in 1800 in the County of Roscommon, Ireland, Parish of Boyle. She died December 18, 1867.

John and Ellen Cavanaugh were the parents of seven children - Bartholomew, Elizabeth Finnell, Dominic, James, Patrick, John, Ellen.

NATURE AFOOT

Southwest of Chicago, at route 4A and 107th Street, a high hill lifts a stone church steeple against the sky. We can drive up the hill to the old cemetery, walk around the stone church, and look down the long slopes to evidence of basic forces that shaped Chicago; oceans, glaciers, drainage.

The church tops the western end of Mount Forest Island, an island that was molded by glacial water rushing toward the Mississippi drainage basin. It was molded from glacial debris brought south by the glacier. The debris was dumped by the glacier on top of the ancient limestone, the bedrock.

Niagara limestone, we call this bedrock that was laid down long before the Rocky Mountains were formed. It shows in many excavations around Chicago. The Eisenhower expressway has made a fresh cut near Mannheim Road.

We stand with our backs to the stone church, the "sag church," and look to the right at Desplaines Valley, to the left at Sag Valley, and ahead to the juncture of the two outlets. Traffic followed these two valleys; Indians, Father Marquette, stagecoaches; then came the canal diggers from Ireland. We read their names on the tombstones; Finnegan, O'Reilly, Kennedy, Casey, Brady, Cavanaugh, Coughlin Kelly... We can look down into the quarries where they got the limestone for this Sag church. We can see the old narrow Illinois-Michigan canal they built, and visualize the momentous day when the first boat passed thru - from New Orleans to Chicago, hailed all along its route with rejoicing. At places we still can find the tow path where the one-horse power plodded.

On the way home we turn the streets of Lemont to look at the old stone buildings, churches, school; and then return to the city for another look at the Chicago water tower, built of limestone from Lemont in 1869.

THOMAS JAMES KELLY was born August 6, 1889, in Fort Wayne in the home on Third and Barthold Sts. He was the son of Robert and Ellen Kelly. He was educated in Fort Wayne in his early years and in 1911 was graduated from Purdue University. From shortly after his graduation until the time of his death he worked for the Northern Indiana Public Service Co. and served as General Manager from 1926. He was active in the Chamber of Commerce and served on many civic committees. He married Margaret Russell on October 10, 1916. They lived on Huffman St after their marriage. Three daughters were born during this time. Thomas was transferred to Lafayette in 1922 and the family moved there and lived at a home on the corner of 27th and South Streets. Thomas James Kelly, Jr. was born here. The family returned to Fort Wayne a year later and purchased the home pictured above at 3018 Shawnee Drive.

Thomas J. Kelly died on January 10, 1951, and is buried in the Catholic Cemetery in Fort Wayne, Indiana.

In 1928, the Thomas Kelly family moved to the home pictured above. There were seven children born in this marriage. Mary Margaret married Aaron Still; there were seven children - Mary Jo, James, Margaret Ann, John, Robert, Louise and Anita. Helen married Ben GiaQuinta; there were six children - Margaret (Peggy), Mary Helen, Mark, Michael, Bengy, Philip. Josephine married Don Dolan; there were four children - Diane, Don, Stephan, Nancy. Thomas J. Jr. married Joan McArdle; there were eight children. Richard married Elizabeth Disher. Daniel married Marita McArdle; there were eleven children - Daniel Jr., Molly, Katherine, Ann Marie (Amy), Julia, Peter, Martha, Colleen, Patrick, Sharon and Michael. (Twin boys, Christopher and Gerard died shortly after birth.) Stephan.

THOMAS J. KELLY, JR. was born February 10, 1923, in Lafayette, Ind. in the Kelly home on the corner of 27th and South Streets. He was educated in Fort Wayne and graduated from Xavier University in Cincinnati, Ohio, in 1947. He served in World War II and in the Korean War in the Field Artillery. He was employed at the U. S. Rubber Co. until February of 1955 when he incorporated the Kelly Box and Packaging Corporation. On May 28, 1949, he married - JOAN THERESE MCARDLE who was born on October 15, 1924, in St.

Joseph Hospital in Fort Wayne. She was educated in Fort Wayne and attended Rosary College in River Forest, Illinois. She taught the kindergarden class at Precious Blood School, was employed by the Peoples Trust Bank and in the office of Dr. Edward McArdle. The home pictured above was the first home purchased by Thomas and Joan in 1950. The first year and a half they lived in the Clinton Court Apts.
